or a second summer, residents at Sunnyside Health Care Center (SHCC) have enjoyed gardening at two adaptive garden planters that allow individuals to get their hands into the dirt while seated, either in a wheelchair or a regular chair. Every Tuesday during the summer, residents have been invited to participate in a structured Garden Club activity, and the gardens are always available for residents to care for and enjoy throughout the summer. This summer, a local Girl Scout troop has participated during Garden Club time, resulting in friendships across the generations.

"I cannot describe how wonderful it is to see residents being able to pursue a life-long leisure preference," Laurie Korby, SHCC Activities Director said. "Being in a wheelchair, or in a nursing home for that matter, does not mean we have to give up all the things that make us who we are."

In 2007, the SHCC Activity Department received a grant from the University of Minnesota Extension Office to help fund the garden. The program was developed by Cheri Danielson, a master gardener with the Carlton County Master Gardeners. Cheri's husband, Marli Danielson, fabricated the planters. Sunnyside resident Nina Mattson spent some time out on the patio pursuing one of her favorite summertime pastimes.

"The therapeutic benefits of gardening have been well-documented," Korby said. "Gardening can improve an individual's sense of well-being, provide upper body exercise, and provide stimulation to the senses."

The adaptive gardening program is just one of the many ways the SHCC Activity Department offers interesting and varied hands-on opportunities that help to make SHCC a warm and welcoming place for residents, families and friends. CMH




