The benefits of Dr. Lemker's new hip replacement procedure

Orthopedic surgeon Dr. Joseph Lemker is now offering a new form of hip replacement surgery. Unlike lateral hip arthroplasty, where the incision is made in the side of the hip, anterior hip arthroplasty features an incision in the front of the hip.

The anterior procedure is considered more comfortable and less intrusive.

"It is a minimally-invasive, tissue-sparing approach that improves early recovery," he explains. "Also, there is usually better pain control and earlier mobility than one would see with traditional hip replacement surgery."

The process is straightforward. First, it involves the patient lying on their back so the incision can be made. Then, an x-ray machine is used to improve the implant positioning. This helps to ensure a hip-to-hip match and length-of-limb equality—key elements in any hip replacement procedure.

Dr. Lemker's patient Matt Gornick speaks highly of the anterior approach.

"The thing that surprised me the most was the recovery time," says Matt. "When I got home, I was climbing stairs the next day."

Within seven or eight days, Matt was using a push lawn-mower. Then, just a week later, he could walk a mile at a time.

The recovery period was shorter and less strenuous than Matt could have imagined. And on the rare occasion he experienced discomfort, Tylenol or Ibuprofen was more than enough to make the pain subside.

While the quicker recovery time and better pain control are certainly appealing, please note that not everyone is a candidate for this new surgery. Only a qualified surgeon can determine who might be a good fit. That said, if for whatever reason the surgery isn't right for you, there's no need to worry. The new procedure takes the same amount of time as traditional hip replacement surgery, and boasts the same end result.

Say goodbye to chronic pain

Those with pain that won't go away can find relief at the CMH Pain Clinic.

Dr. Paul Vollmar, Pain Clinic Director and anesthesiologist, treats all kinds of pain across the body. He and his team offer treatment options and procedures to block the pain's pathway, stun the nerves, or reduce inflammation in order to lessen pain. 90-95% of Dr. Vollmar's patients experience at least some type of pain relief.

Just ask Karen Wunderlich, who started seeing Dr. Vollmar after traditional methods fell short.

"He took a lot of time and paid a lot of attention to what had been done," explains Karen. "And to what I wanted to do for the rest of my life."

She and Dr. Vollmar discussed various options, and agreed to administer steroid injections in Karen's back every two months. As a result of the treatment, Karen has gone from using a walker to being independent—and she says her comfort

level is 100% from the time she receives the injections until they wear off.

"I totally trust him and wouldn't go anywhere else," she says.

Karen does, however, urge patients who struggle with chronic pain to manage their expectations. Some things are simply not curable—but discomfort can absolutely be controlled. Dr. Vollmar agrees, and puts the patient first each and every time.

"My goal is to get people back to a better life," explains Dr. Vollmar. "Whatever that means for them."
